



Guide to Welsh Government Learning Grant Further Education 2022/23



This guide will tell you what you need to know.

What is the Welsh Government Learning Grant Further Education?

It provides funding to help with the costs of your education if you're aged 19 or over. If you're studying full-time you could get payments of up to £1,500 a year or, if studying part-time, you could get up to £750 a year.

Who can get it?

You need to meet the following requirements to get the grant:

Age

To get this grant you must be aged 19 or over, so for academic year 2022/23 you must be 19 or older on 1st September 2022.

Course

You must be studying an eligible course. Eligible courses include:

- GCSE
- 'A' or 'AS' levels
- BTEC, GNVQ, NVQ
- Basic Skills courses
- Independent Living Skills or, if studying in England, Preparation for Adulthood

Courses at level 4 and above are not eligible. Your school or college can tell you if your course is eligible.

Nationality and Residency

If you're a UK citizen living in Wales, you could be eligible for Welsh Government Learning Grant Further Education.

If you're not a UK citizen you may still be eligible. Go to www.studentfinancewales.co.uk/wglgfe for more information.

Care Leavers

If you're a care leaver and meet the above requirements, you could be eligible for Welsh Government Learning Grant Further Education.

Your household income

Your household income must be £18,370 or less in order to get this grant.

If you live with your parent(s) this is based on the highest of you or your parent(s) income.

If you don't live with your parent(s) this is based on your income.

If you live with your partner this is based on the highest of you or your partner's income.

If you are a care leaver, you won't need to give us any financial details.

How much could I get?

The table below shows how much you could get based on your household income and the number of hours you will be studying.

Household Income	Entitlement	
	Studying part-time (between 275 and 499 hours)	Studying full-time (500 or more hours)
£0 - £6,120	£750	£1,500
£6,121 - £12,235	£450	£750
£12,236 - £18,370	£300	£450
£18,371 and above	£0	£0

If your household income is £18,371 or more, or you're studying less than 275 hours, you won't be able to get this grant.

3 easy steps to get your grant

1

You complete and return your application.

Remember to pay the correct postage and get proof of postage.

We'll assess your application and send you a Provisional Award letter.

If your application is successful this shows how much you could get.

2

You sign a WGLG FE Agreement.

Once you receive your Provisional Award letter, you need to sign a WGLG FE Agreement at your school or college.

We'll send you a Final Award letter.

When your school or college tells us your WGLG FE Agreement has been signed, your Final Award letter confirms how much you'll get.

3

You attend your course and get paid.

Do you already get the Welsh Government Learning Grant Further Education?

You don't need to do anything. We'll contact you in the spring about your grant for 2022/23.

Step 1 – Applying

When do I apply?

You'll be able to apply in spring 2022, keep an eye on the website for more information closer to the time. You should return your application as soon as you can and as far in advance of your course start date as possible.

How do I apply?

You need to complete an application form. Forms will be available from your school or college or online at www.studentfinancewales.co.uk/wglgfe

Final deadline

We must have received your application within 9 months of your course start date.

Will I need to send anything with my application?

As part of your application you'll need to send us:

- proof of your identity
- proof of your address

Depending on your personal situation, you might also have to send additional documents but the application form will tell you exactly what to send.

Can I apply if I don't have these documents?

Yes. You can send us your application without these documents. By doing this we can make a start on your application earlier, but we won't be able to pay you. We'll contact you to get the documents we need after you've applied. You need to send us your evidence within 12 months of your course start date.

Step 2 – Your WGLG FE Agreement

This is an agreement between you and your school or college. It details the attendance requirements and learning objectives you'll need to meet during your course to get your grant each term.

Your WGLG FE Agreement is unique to you so once you've applied and got your Provisional Award letter from us you should speak to your school or college to get your agreement arranged and signed.

Step 3 – Getting paid

If you attend as agreed you'll be paid once each term, directly into your bank, building society or credit union. You'll need to make sure we always have your most up to date account details or we won't be able to pay you.

What if my circumstances change?

You need to tell us straight away if any of your details change, including:

- If your bank, building society or credit union details change
- If your contact details change
- If your household income changes
- If you change school or college
